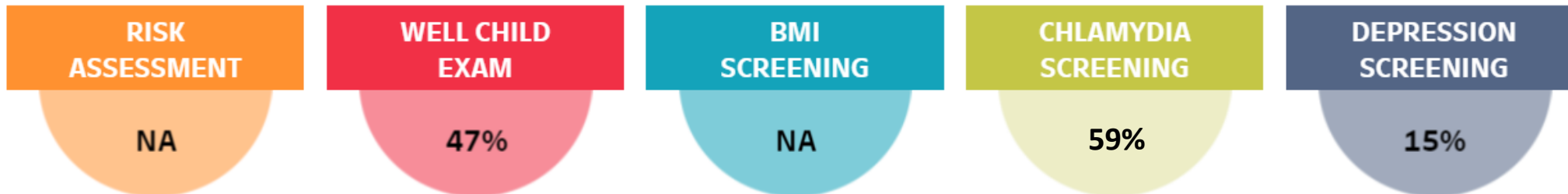

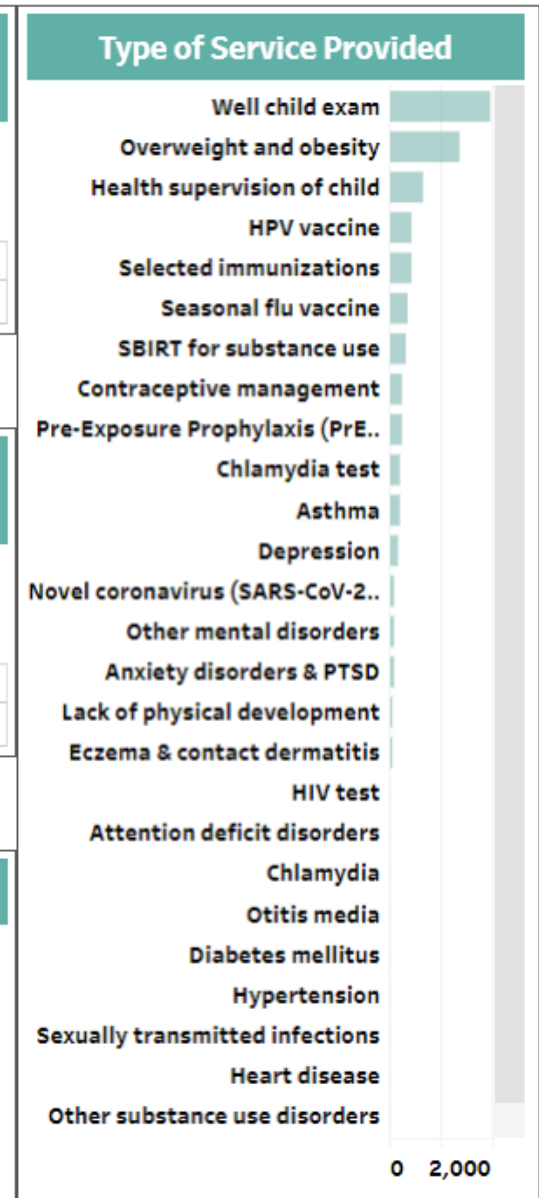

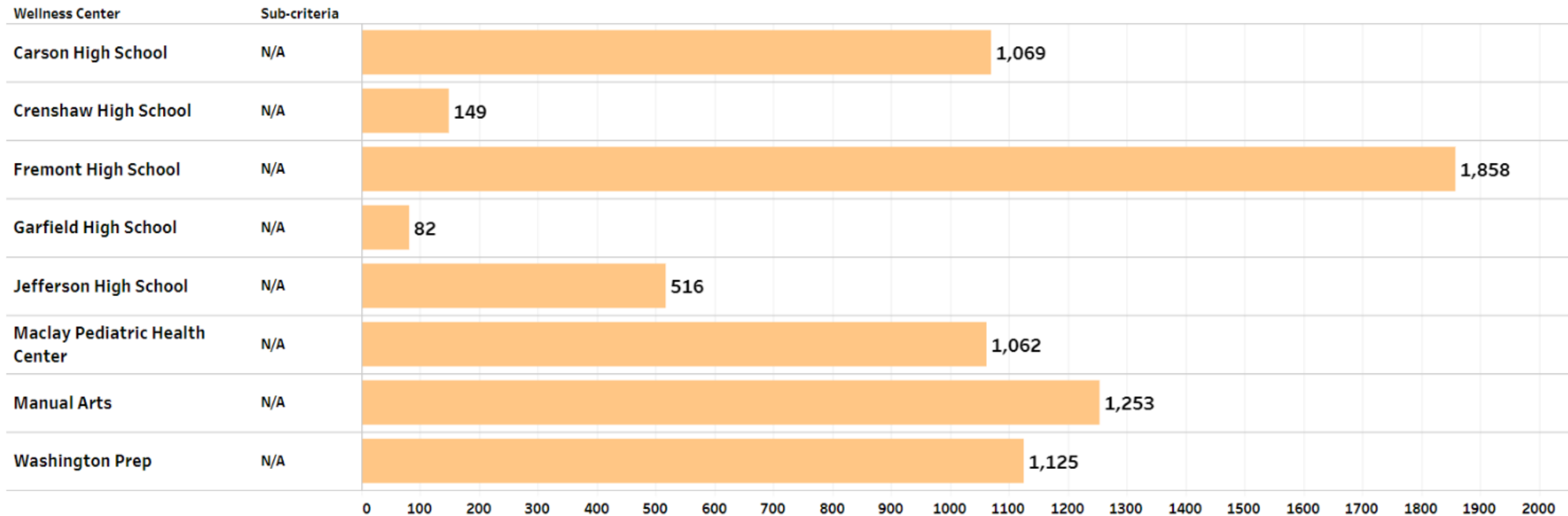

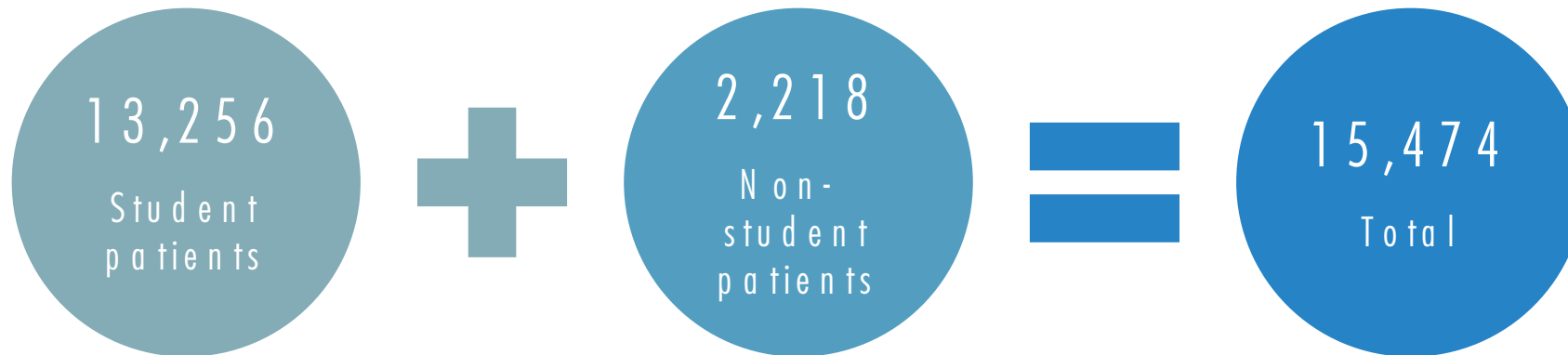
# **Wellness Network Mental Health Encounter:**

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# Cumulative Mental Health Encounters: 2020- 21\*



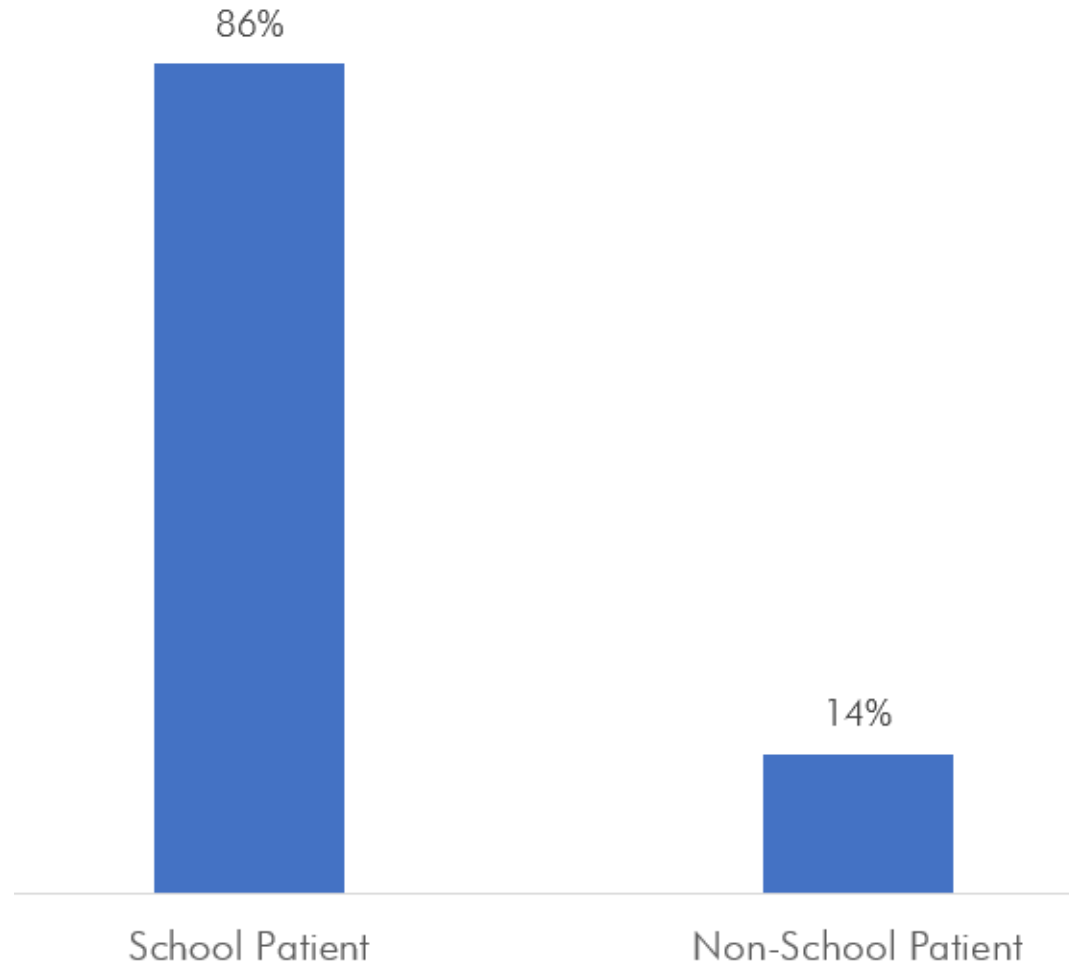

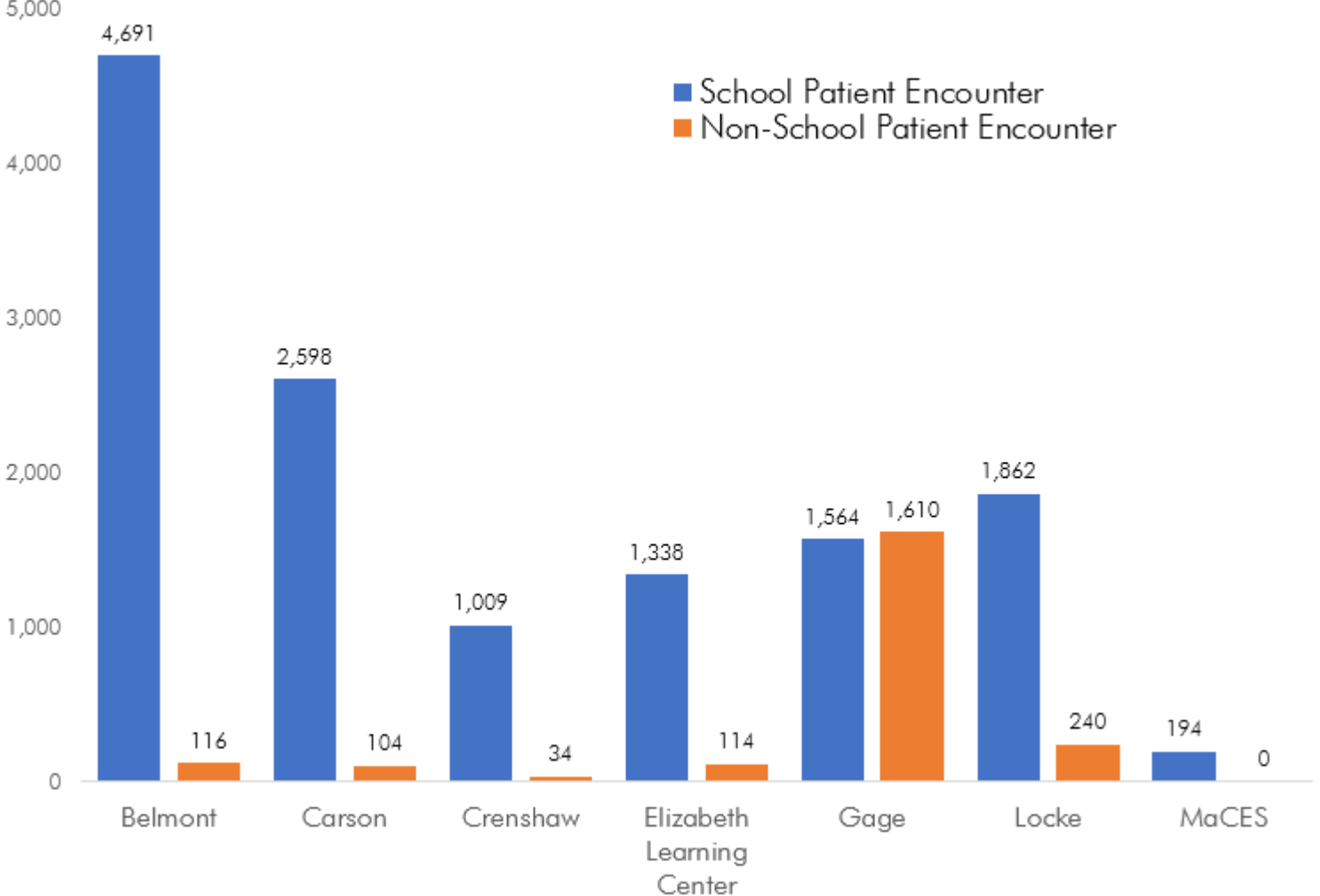
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# Proportion of school patient vs. non- school patient encounters

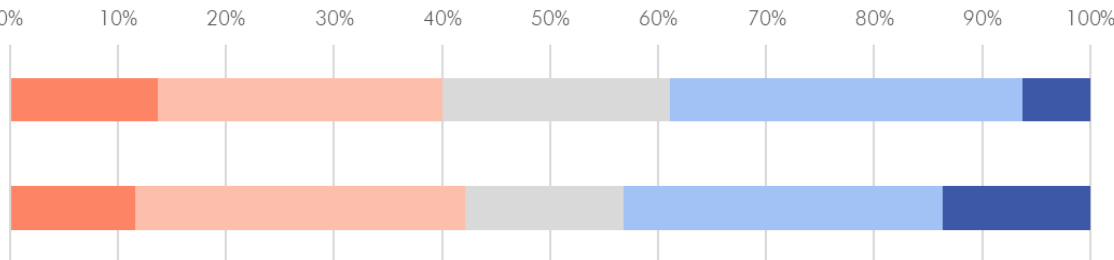


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## Health Authority

SBHC actively promotes campus-wide policies and practices that assure a safe and healthy school environment for all students and staff, including participation in school's crisis prevention and intervention plans.

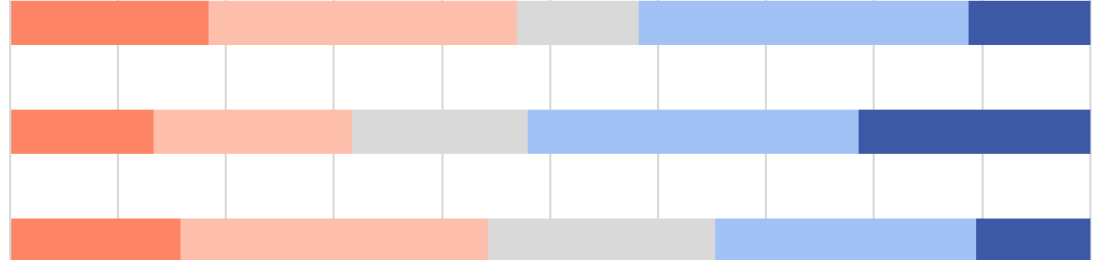


## Integrated Programming

SBHC conducts schoolwide health campaigns or events.

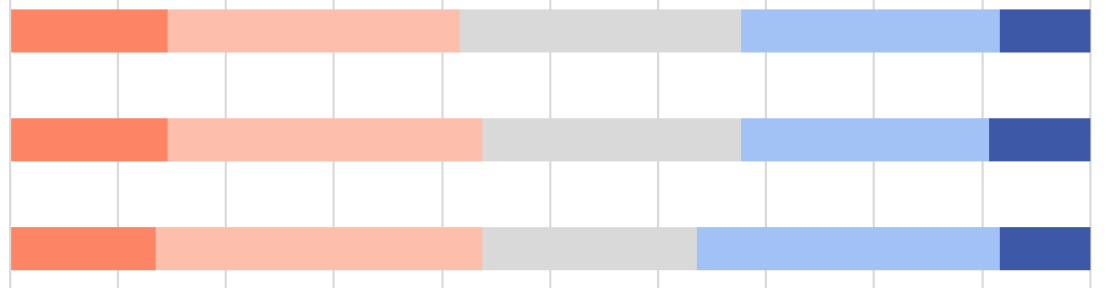


## Marketing and Recruitment

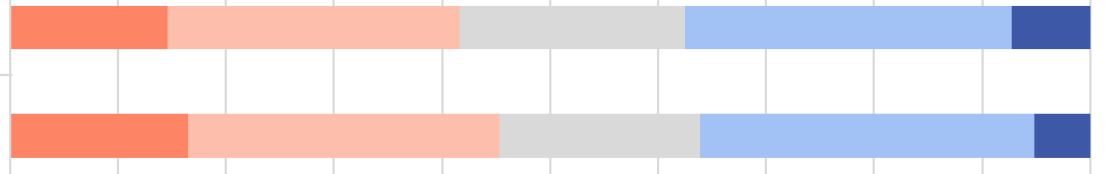

SBHC successfully enrolls students in services who are identified in school population screens.

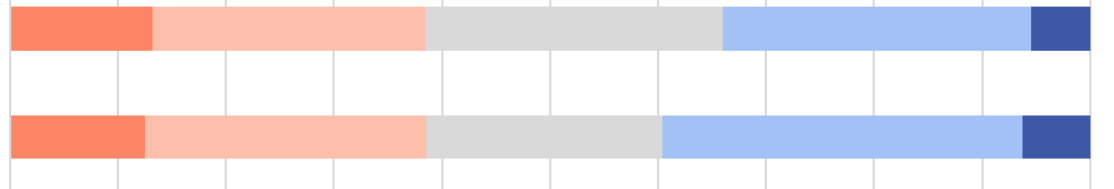
SBHC and school regularly and actively exchange information about aggregate student well-being and outcomes.

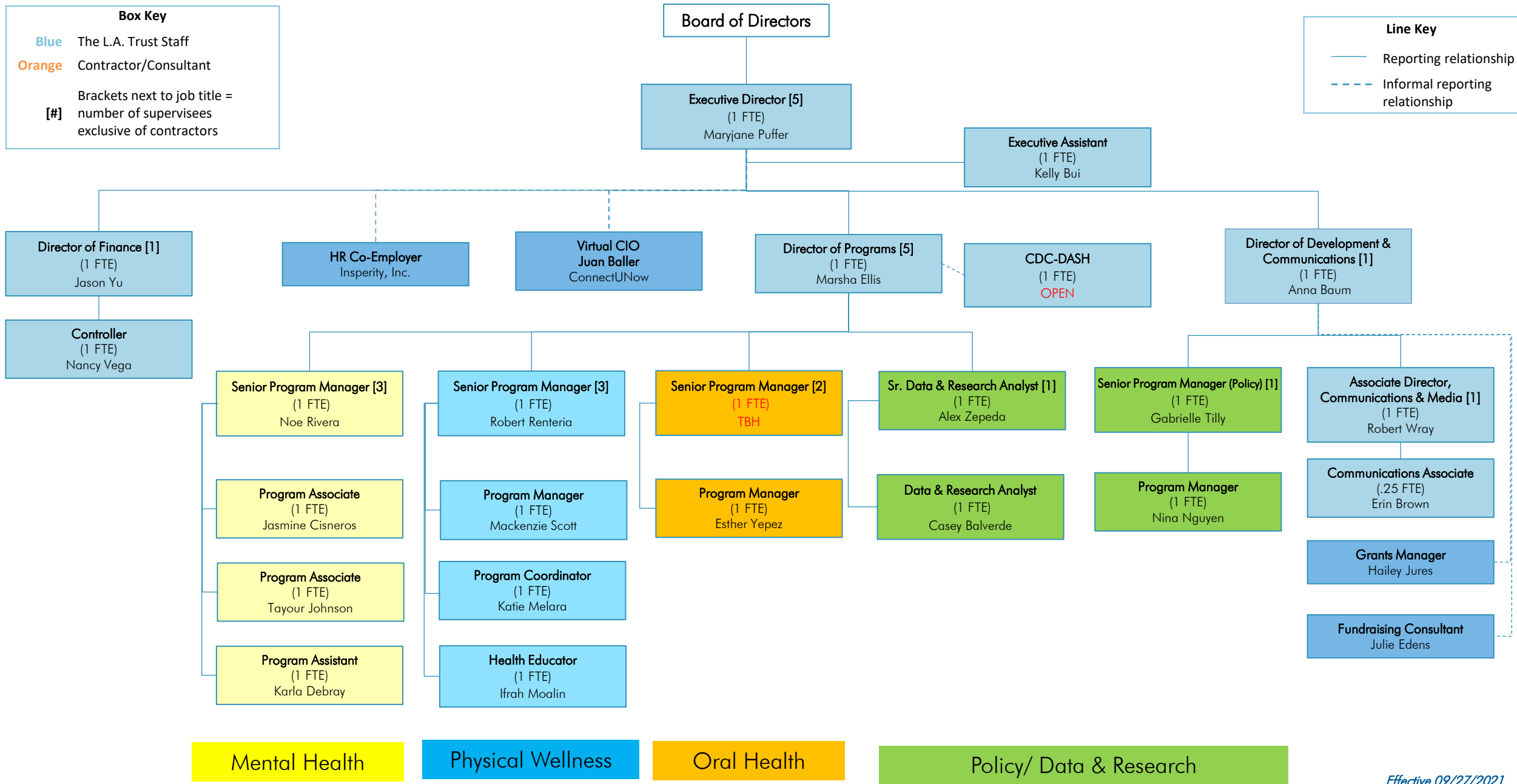
